Title of Lesson: Pennant Race

Curriculum Unit: Group Dynamics

Objective: Students will be able to recognize and describe the benefits of working as a team versus working as an individual.

Materials:

- Construction paper cut in pennant shapes
- Glue sticks
- Alphabet stencils
- Colored pencils and markers
- Decorative items like glitter, stickers, etc.
- A completed example of the finished product (a school pennant)

Directions:

- 1. Divide the class into teams of four. Select or ask for two class members to work individually.
- 2. Using the materials provided, each group/individual will see how many pennant they can create in the time allowed (about half the class period).
- 3. Students in groups will need to determine a division of labor to complete the task, e.g. an assembly line. Individuals will complete pennants on their own.
- 4. At the end of the allotted time, results will be tallied from each group/individual. The most successful workers will be recognized (or win a prize if you are so inclined).

Sample Processing Questions:

- What did you do to organize the work?
- Which was more effective, working in a team or working as an individual? Why?
- What benefits, if any, did you see in working as a team?
- What benefits, if any, did you see in working as an individual?
- In leadership, where is it useful to work as a team? As an individual?
- How can we apply what we learned from this experience to our roles as school leaders?
